To the Bureau of Reclamation,

I had real technical difficulties with your webinar today. Although I was able to access it and watch it live, I was unable to view the slides you presented or to ask questions either by raising my hand or by submitting them in writing through the Chat system. I tried to send in 3 questions and the bureau offcials running the Webinar didn't mention them even though they mentioned other questions that came in via Chat.

So I'm submitting those 3 questions, plus one more, this way in hopes of getting answers today.

Here goes:

1)If the bureau does make a final decision in summer 2023 to reduce releases from Powell or to the Lower Basin in general, when will such reductions take effect? In fall 2023 or in calendar year 2024?

2)Which entity or entities will decide how the various reductions would be apportioned among the various states in the Lower Basin and/or among the various contractors such as irrigation districts and water districts such as the Central Arizona Project or the Imperial Irrigation District or the Metropolitan Water District or the numerous irrigation districts in the Yuma area?

Will the bureau make such decisions or will that be done collaboratively with the Lower Basin states?

3)If we have a better than average runoff season this upcoming winter and spring, will that delay or reduce the scale of cutbacks in water deliveries from Powell under whatever alternative you choose/

4) Why are no cutbacks in water use being looked at for the Upper Basin states?
