

JOHN C. PAGE TO PRESIDE AT BIG CELEBRATION AT BOULDER DAM

Ceremonies Will Begin At
11 O'clock With Many
Celebrities Present

HANSEN WILL SPEAK

Sculptor Who Designed
Plaques and Other Dec-
orative Features Here

Ceremonies dedicating a plaque to labor and commemorating workmen who lost their lives during the construction of the Boulder Canyon project, will be held on Boulder dam tomorrow, with Commissioner John C. Page of the bureau of reclamation of Washington, D. C., making the principal address at the unveiling of the bronze plaque erected on the Arizona canyon wall across the spillway bridge from the dam.

The dedication is scheduled for 11 o'clock tomorrow morning, and Ralph Lowry, construction engineer for the bureau of reclamation at Boulder dam, will act as master of ceremonies at the exercises. Oskar J. W. Hansen, famous sculptor who designed the plaque and other artistic features at the dam, also will speak on the program.

In conjunction with the unveiling of the plaque, flag-raising ceremonies will be held for the first time at the new flagpole unit on the safety island on the Nevada side of the dam. A CCC enrollee has been assigned by Captain Charles L. Hall to act as bugler to salute the American flag as it is hoisted into place to fly over Boulder dam for the first time. Members of the national parks service also will participate in the flag raising ceremonies, it is reported.

HANSEN'S WORK for the project includes the modeled winged figures which guard the flagpole, modeled plaster figures which have been cast in concrete in the elevator towers and the bronze plaque dedicated to labor.

Commissioner Page, who formerly was stationed at Boulder City in the capacity of office engineer for the bureau of reclamation, arrived in Las Vegas last night from an extensive tour of western reclamation projects and came here for the purpose of speaking at the ceremonies scheduled tomorrow at the dam. He was accompanied from Reno by Construction Engineer Lowry, who made the trip to Reno to meet him.

PAGE PLANS to leave Las Vegas by Union Pacific train at 5:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon for Salt Lake City and will stop in Grand Junction, Colorado, before continuing his trip back to his offices in Washington, D. C.
