

Business has taken a decided up-
rend in Las Vegas and Boulder
City. It has followed quite dis-
tinctly, the employment line on the
Boulder canyon project. For some
weeks after the first of May there
was a general layoff on the project
as various units of the work were
completed. In the absence of any
official statement by the contract-
ing company, those remaining at
work, tightened up on expenditures
in anticipation of being out of a
job at any moment. But the bot-
tom was reached, and the employ-
ment curve is again upward. Those
at work regularly have loosened
the purse-strings, and the hundreds
being added to the payroll lend ad-
ditional strength to the situation.
From a local standpoint, the slump
is definitely passed, and there
looms just ahead the greatest pe-
riod of construction activity during
the entire life of the project.
There will be over 4,000 men at
work on the job, and that means
the peak of business experienced
during the spring of the year, will
be far exceeded from September to
June of next year. Regardless of
the rest of the country, southern
Nevada is ready for another prof-
itable year. The temporary tight-
