

L. A. BUREAU OF LIGHT, POWER OBSERVES NRA CODE ON JOB

48 Hour Week at \$4 a Day Schedule in Effect on Line Job

The Los Angeles Bureau of Power and Light, having one of its line camps in Boulder City, is outstanding among employers of the United States, according to A. P. Cox, superintendent, because of the fact that the NRA code is being strictly observed. A 48-hour week has been inaugurated, with no pay cut being administered to employees. A wage of \$4.00 per day is paid laborers, with skilled workmen's wages being advanced accordingly. An 8-hour day is also in effect, according to Cox.

The camp is located in close proximity to Boulder City, and the men are employed by the company putting in the power line

which will transport electrical energy from the turbines of the power houses of Boulder dam for use in Los Angeles and vicinity is one of the finest in this region. Nearly 100 men, at the present time, are living at the camp; several live elsewhere in Boulder City, and many more commute daily between Boulder City and Las Vegas. Twenty-three tent houses accommodate the residents of the camp, with four and five living in each house. There is an office building and a large warehouse. A mess-hall, under the supervision of James Bondi, chief steward, supplies the men with wholesome and unexcelled food. A first aid man is available at all times to administer to ailments of employees. A charge of \$1.40 a day is made residents of the camp for lodging and board facilities.
