

Second Boulder Dam Broadcast to Be Heard Over NBC Networks Tomorrow

Boulder dam, which made its debut on the ether waves yesterday, will go on the air once again tomorrow when the NBC red and blue networks carry the story of the dam into the homes of the nation thru 60 stations scattered throuth the land.

The program, a half hour one starting at 12 o'clock noon, will be broadcast from the Boulder theater stage and a series of short talks will be given by prominent residents of the dam community.

Sims Ely, city manager of Boulder City, Chief Trimble, of the reservation rangers, E. Graham, hook-tender for the government cableway; J. Dexheimer, government engineer; Otto Liltler, government engineer; Jack McFee, laborer who escaped death in a fall in one of the diversion tunnels, and Parson Tom Stevenson, of the Community church, will be on the program.

Frank T. Crowe, construction superintendent for Six Companies, and Basil T. Kehoe, manager of the Babcock-Wilcox steel plant, also may appear before the mike for short talks.

The musical entertainment will

feature Chip White and his dam band, according to present plans.

The broadcast will be in charge of Cliff Engle, of the San Francisco office of the NBC and one of the men who officiated at one of the mikes on the first broadcast. Don Thompson, ace announcer from the west coast studios of the company, is expected to be present also.

The broadcast tomorrow is to give a complete story background of the construction of Boulder dam in contrast to the "action" broadcast given at the dam site yesterday.

The broadcast can be heard over KFI or KOA, both stations which can be heard in Las Vegas in the daytime.

Earle J. Brothers, of the Boulder theatre, announced this morning that the swing-shift matinee would be eliminated on Sunday, but that the doors of the theatre would be opened at 11:15, in order that those interested might view the installation and explanation of equipment to be used by the radio technicians. No admission charge is to be made, Brothers said today, and the Boulder City public is invited to attend.
