

COLORADO HITS 100,000 MARK

The flow of the Colorado river topped the 100,000 second foot mark today for the first time in several years, when the river was recorded as pouring 101,000 second feet into Boulder lake.

This inflow has increased over 76,000 feet during the past month, bureau of reclamation engineers pointed out. Last year's peak was only 25,000 second feet.

The elevation of the lake this morning was 868 feet above sea-level, rising at the rate of approximately three feet per day.

The lakee itself is 72 miles long and now extends above the Grand Wash. The upper part of the lake now is almost entirely in Arizona.

The outflow thru the tunnels is recorded as 17,000 second feet.
