

Mormon Choir Dam Concert Is Great Hit

From the crest of the Boulder dam the Mormon tabernacle choir from Salt Lake City presented a program of music this morning before a crowd of 400 Boulder City and Las Vegas residents, while the cameraman from Hearst Metrotone News and Fox Films recorded the concert to be presented on the movie screens throughout the nation.

More than 150 cars were crowded onto the dam as the program started today when the audience gathered to attend the unique presentation of the voices of the 350 singers from the top of the greatest engineering project in the world.

The choir, which has been spending a week in San Diego presenting programs at the exposition, arrived here this morning in a special Union Pacific train and proceeded to Boulder City in motor caravan arranged by the Las Vegas chamber of commerce.

The music was under the direction of Albert Southwick, with Richard Evans, radio announcer from K. S. L. in Salt Lake City, announcing the numbers.

R. B. Denton, of Los Angeles, of the Union Pacific news bureau, who arranged for the movie cameramen to attend the program, was present to photograph the scene. C. Bjerre and Roy Kløver of Hearst Metrotone, and W. T. Wall of Fox Films recorded the concert for the movies.

Following the concert, the choir members were shown over the Boulder Canyon project and returned to Las Vegas in time for lunch.

The choir was scheduled to appear at 4 o'clock this afternoon on the lawn of the Clark county courthouse to present a program for Las Vegas residents.

The group will leave at 6 o'clock by train to return to Salt Lake City.

The choir is one of the outstanding musical organizations of its kind in the nation, according to music critics.
