

# DEFINITE DATE LEARNED TODAY FOR PRESIDENT VISIT TO DAM

Exact Time of Arrival in  
City Is Not Known as  
Yet, Said

## PROGRAM UNKNOWN

Speech at Boulder Dam to  
Be Broadcast Over Two  
Networks

President Franklin D. Roosevelt will pay his scheduled visit to Boulder dam on Monday, September 30, the Review-Journal definitely learned this morning from an unimpeachable source.

As outlined by this paper several days ago, the presidential special will arrive at Boulder City some time early Monday morning and leave in the afternoon for Los Angeles. The definite time of arrival, however, has not yet been announced.

WHILE THERE is nothing definite as to the actual program to be followed by the chief executive while at Boulder City, it is believed he will spend most of the morning going over the Boulder dam project, perhaps enjoying a ride on the lake. It is believed probable that he will have dinner in the Anderson mess hall at noon and then be driven to the dam itself where he will deliver a short address.

Whether the president will formally dedicate the dam on that date or confine his remarks to the project itself, is not definitely known. Bureau of reclamation officials said this morning they were in the dark on this point, and that there had never been anything given out from Washington to indicate that the visit of the chief executive would be the occasion for formal dedicatory ceremonies.

FOLLOWING the afternoon program, the president will be whisked back to his special train and speeded on his way to the coast, it is understood.

His talk will be broadcast over the network of the National Broadcasting company and probably that of Columbia, although the plans of the latter company are not definitely known.

Indications are that Las Vegas and Boulder City will play host to the greatest crowd that has ever gathered in these parts on the occasion of the president's visit, and appropriate arrangements to handle the throng will be made during the week.

THE PRESIDENT will be accompanied as far as Boulder dam by Secretary Harold Ickes of the interior department and Harry Hopkins, works progress administrator.

Coincident with the news that Monday has been definitely chosen as the date, comes a press dispatch in which Postmaster General Farley announces that the Boulder dam stamp will be placed on sale in Boulder City on Monday, September 30, and in other post-offices at a later date, instead of being offered on Saturday as was first announced.
