

# Hospital In B. C. To Be Made An Office Building

The former Six companies hospital in Boulder City, where hundreds of sick and injured workmen were treated during construction of Boulder Dam, will soon be transformed into an office building for the National Park Service, according to Guy Edwards, supervisor, who stated that bids amounting to \$12,000 have been let for the remodeling work.

The red brick of the outside of the building will be changed to a buff color similar to the post office building. Entrances to the building will be rebuilt, the main entrance having a shallow porch supported by two columns.

Offices of the various departments of the park service will be built on the main floor, with a geology laboratory replacing the hospital kitchen. A museum will occupy the south end of the building which was formerly the hospital ward, on the main floor and the part of the basement directly below. The remainder of the basement will be used as storage space.

An intercommunicating system will connect all of the offices without using the outside telephone service.

Bidders awarded contracts include: Boulder Builders Supply, Lou Meisner, Frank Beam lumber company, and El Portal electric equipment.

Work will begin immediately on the remodeling, Edwards stated.
