

Buzz Holstrom and Party Land At Boulder Lake Dock Sunday

Having conquered every rapid along the Colorado river on his second trek and made the only solo trip down the river on his first trip, Buzz Holstrom landed at the boat docks on Boulder lake yesterday afternoon and reported that his plans to continue south on the river below Boulder dam to the Gulf of California were indefinite.

Holstrom was accompanied by Amos Burg and Willis Johnson, who made motion pictures of the trip, to show at the San Francisco Exposition, where Holstrom's boat, used both on this trip and his trip alone down the river last year, also will be displayed.

Holstrom and his two companions started the trip August 26 at Green River, Utah. Besides Holstrom's sturdy boat, they used an 83-pound rubber boat, which Holstrom said proved entirely satisfactory on the trip.

This expedition is the ninth to thread the course of the Colorado, but the first to shoot all the rapids, Holstrom said.

Lava Falls, known to rivermen as the most hazardous on the Colorado, proved a trying experience to Holstrom, but he managed to make it safely through the rapids. His boat sprung three leaks, but he carried materials with which to patch it and was able to continue the trip without delay.

Above Bright Angel point the party discovered the battered remains of Jack Aldredge's boat but no traces of the man, who has been missing two months. He also started from Green River, Utah, to attempt the trip down the Colorado to Boulder dam.

When the expedition started in August, Holstrom planned to con-

tinue down to the gulf and make the first complete trip in years. Upon arriving at the boat dock yesterday, Holstrom said his plans for continuing on down the river were indefinite.

Holstrom's party was met at Pierce's Ferry by a Grand Canyon-Boulder Dam Tours boat, and the boats were towed in to the docks.

Today the party was making motion picture shots at Boulder dam to complete the film saga of the trip down the Colorado to the upstream face of the dam.
