

## BOULDER DAM FUND

It is reported from Carson City that the state treasurer and the state controller have decided to follow the legal advice of the state attorney general and have issued a check in the amount of \$60,000 to the treasurer of Clark county as the compromise share, confirmed by the legislature, of the \$300,000 compromise amount of Boulder Dam revenues, also confirmed by act of congress.

Just why it should so bitterly hurt some of the newspapers and statesmen of Reno and the northern part of the state, to permit Clark county to reap a share of the fund to which she is both morally and legally entitled, has long been and still is a puzzle to many of us who know the truth about the whole matter.
