Did you know that excavations were being continued in the Moapa valley to find other evidences of the great city which existed there fifteen hundred years ago, and that wherever these explorations are made in earnest, relics of the forgotten civilization responsible for the "Lost City" are being uncovered? If you do not know, then you should, for here at our very door is one of the most interesting, and perhaps one of the most significant relics in the southwest.

You have heard of the Lost City, in a vague sort of way, know there is such a thing up somewhere near St. Thomas, but did you realize that this city, instead of being restricted to a small area, extended from the junction of the Virgin and Muddy rivers to the Big Springs at the head of the Muddy? That this city, in its heyday, occupied a space 30 miles long by three miles wide? That its population was somewhat in excess of 25,000 people of a civilization which flourished about the time of Christ?

These and many other surprises await you as a result of the original efforts of the Southwest Museum and the more recent explorations of the Perkins Brothers near Overton, urged on by Dr. Wm. S. Park and other interested local citizens who have an idea that this area constitutes an excellent tourist attraction and that important discoveries still remain to be made.

Excavations now being made on the high land back of Overton, still reveal the floors of houses, pottery, and other relics of this civilization long forgotten, and while you're considering these things, you cannot help but wonder why there isn't some kind of a written record of this great city and its inhabitants, or why there isn't some tradition handed down in the lore of the Indians now residing in that area.

Dr. Park has an idea that Clark county ought to be interested in this gigantic relic in its midst and with that in mind is organizing an archaeological society to further the investigations in that area. This society should find plenty of support for the possibilities from this gigantic city if properly bounded, as a tourist attraction
