

Flowers Warns

Dam Rum Vendors

R. O. Chugg, recently arraigned before United States Commissioner W. J. Flowers for liquor violation on the Hoover Dam project reservation, and who was released on his recognizance with surety, has been refused the privilege of remaining on the reservation because of his liquor violation. He was returned to Commissioner Flowers this morning on the same charge, and his recognizance was canceled and he is being held under a \$2,000 bond.

Chugg claimed to be a victim of circumstances when pleading his case.

"This should be a warning to all the workmen on the project that the reclamation bureau will not tolerate liquor violations on the reservation, and the sign at the gateway of the reservation means just what it says," Commissioner Flowers said in regard to the case.

"The injured party will undoubtedly feel that an injustice is done him," Flowers said, "but back of it lies the fact that a federal law on the statute books is being violated, a great engineering project is being held back; many men's lives are being held in jeopardy, and families caused extreme suffering, because somebody insisted on their draught of liquor. I hope that this will be a warning to the would be violators," the commissioner concluded.
