

Boulder City Demo Rally Huge Success

Scrugham and McCarran Are Given Riotous Wel- come by Dam Workers

In the most effective political rally yet held in Boulder City, Pat McCarran and J. G. Scrugham, candidates for senate and congress, last night, talked to an audience which jammed the large Boulder City Legion hall to the doors.

Scrugham sent the crowd into ecstasies by a slashing attack on statements made by L. T. Blood, deputy state labor commissioner, in Boulder City earlier in the week, in which he charged that he, Scrugham, in 1928 made a trip to Washington as the agent of the power trust to aid in the fight against the Boulder Canyon project.

Scrugham broke his long silence on this point, to read a certified copy of a telegram urging him to make the trip in the interests of putting over the dam project, and signed by Herbert Hoover, then secretary of commerce, taking an active part in the campaign for the Colorado River development program.

Scrugham declared the reason he had never cleared the atmosphere on this question before, was because that telegram and letters covering the same subject were all confidential. He also referred to letters from Hoover, and Secretary Hubert Work of the Interior department, thanking him for his services and pointing out that he had been very helpful in working out the final program.

Scrugham declared for the repeal of the eighteenth amendment and payment of the soldiers' bonus.

McCarran, who formerly was justice of the Nevada supreme court, pledged his support toward payment of the soldiers' bonus at the earliest possible time, picturing the treatment given the bonus army by the republican administration.
