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### **Idahoans Will Build the Dam.**

Frank T. Crowe left Boise Monday to take up his residence at Boulder City, Nevada, where he will build Boulder dam, the biggest dam undertaking which man has ever tackled. Crowe was selected as chief engineer for the Six Companies, Inc., which was awarded the government \$49,000,000 job. He is 48 years old, Canada born, a graduate of the University of Maine and is known as "Hurry Up" Crowe.

Another Idaho man who enters largely into the dam program is Frank Morrison of the Morrison-Knudsen company, the prime mover in the organization of the Six Companies, Inc., which placed the lowest bid on the dam construction. Not only will he build the dam on the Colorado river, but he will also do a lot of other construction work on highways, irrigation projects and similar enterprises at the same time. Varied in his training in construction work, he will bring to the Boulder project the ripe experience of twenty years of successful business experience. That the job will be well done, no one who knows Frank Morrison doubts.

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### **From Warren, Arkansas.**

We are in receipt of a copy of the Eagle Democrat, published at Warren, Arkansas, in which are listed the arrival of four cars of produce for relief of the drouth stricken, valued at \$6,622, from various parts of the country. One car of potatoes from Stockton, California; and another car of spuds from Monte Vista, Colorado; one containing 820 sacks of flour from Redfield, South Dakota, wheat contributed by farmers and milled there free of cost. The other car came from Buhl, Idaho. Part of the newspaper is torn away, but the contents of the Buhl car is evidently given.

An item in the Eagle Democrat states that federal loans to farmers for use in buying feed, seed and fertilizer for their 1931 crops totaled \$8,510. The county agent says that one hundred applications had been received. Note is also made that the state legislature of Arkansas had just appropriated \$1,500,000 for farm relief work. The Red Cross urged beneficiaries to be on their own after March 1st, so far as possible. A copy of the letter sent to the Buhl Red Cross chapter is published in the paper.
