

# BRANDS HOOVER AS TOOL OF BIG BUSINESS; SEES DEMO LAND SLIDE

Nevada Solon Discusses  
Letters Circulated by  
Six Company Officials

SAYS GOP DESPERATE

U. S. Attorneys May Find  
Out Why Big Business  
Intimidates Workers  
Says

Predicting an overwhelming victory for Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt on November 8, tearing to bits with keen-knife-like thrusts the campaign of terrorism to which the republicans have turned in last-minute desperation, charging President Hoover with being the tool of the great financial interests and opposing every measure for relief of destitution, and predicting that Nevada could hope for little relief either from the tyranny of the present Boulder canyon policy of the secretary of the Interior, or from the present intolerable position of silver, United States Senator Key Pittman of Nevada landed in the middle of the national campaign in Clark county last evening, to urge the election of the entire democratic ticket and bring a message of optimism coincident with the impending democratic success in November.

The dynamic Nevada senator spoke at two rapid-fire meetings, one in Boulder City and one in Las Vegas, with somewhat over 2,000 interested voters gathering to greet him.

Senator Pittman's Boulder City address was given over principally to an expose of the campaign of terrorism being waged by the republican leaders in a frantic effort to stem the democratic tide, and devoted considerable time to discussing the letters recently circulated by Six Companies Incorporated dealing with the recent appropriation for the Boulder Canyon project, copies of which are published on another page in this issue.

Declaring that the only hope of the republican party to make any inroads on the democratic bulwarks lay in the campaign of fear he charged had been instituted by the great financial interests in a desperate attempt to save the President, Senator Pittman pointed out that everywhere in industry this attempt is being made.

"THE BANKERS call in the industrial leaders who are indebted to them and demand that they pass the word on to their men. The leaders then advise their superintendents and the superintendents tell the men that unless Hoover is re-elected, they will undoubtedly lose their jobs," Senator Pittman declared.

"This has been done by the great copper interests, and as near to us as Ely, Nevada. It is being done by the railroads and the automobile manufacturers. But it won't work.
