

WORK IS BEGUN ON TEMPORARY QUARTERS FOR CAMP BUILDERS

Architect Here Presumably to Cooperate in Design of Houses.

WORK IS RUSHED

No Time to Be Lost in Getting Down to Long Grind of Construction.

Construction of the great Boulder Canyon project was definitely launched this morning by the Six Companies, Inc., successful bidders, when a crew of men inaugurated the work of establishing a camp to house the fifty men who will be on the job at once erecting quarters for the contractors' men at Boulder City.

The camp is being established by the Anderson company, commissary concern for both the Letourneau and Lewis Construction companies now at work on their portion of the project, and is expected to be ready to accommodate the men tomorrow.

AS SOON AS the quarters are available the men will start work building the dormitories and homes for the workmen who will build the Boulder canyon project. Truck loads of materials, beds, blankets and other equipment for the temporary camp arrived from Los Angeles last evening by truck, and were transported to the dam site this morning for erection.

The presence in this city today of architects and executives of Six Companies, Inc., and the starting of a week of conferences among officials of the dam contractors, are taken to indicate that the men in charge of the great job are pushing the problem of building living quarters as fast as possible, and that on the preliminary work on the Boulder canyon project the "Big Six" is hitting on all cylinders!

George De Colmesnil, architect of San Francisco, is among the men who arrived in Las Vegas this morning for the series of conferences which are being held this week. While nothing definite has been announced by the contractors, and while De Colmesnil declined to make any statement whatsoever this morning, close observers of developments see in his presence here probable evidence of the intent of the "Big Six" to speed up construction of Boulder City and get the work going in a big way immediately.

THE OFFICE SUITE of Six companies, in the Clark building, is one of the busiest places in Las Vegas, ever since its establishment last week. Secretary Robert Climie is kept busy constantly answering calls and making appointments with his chief, the waiting room being occupied most of the time by several men waiting to see Frank T. Crowe, construction superintendent.

Offices for the company will be established at Boulder City in the near future, offices probably to be maintained in Las Vegas, also, it is stated by officials of the company.
