

SENATE, HOUSE IN APPROVAL OF WAGNER BILL; IS UP TO PRESIDENT

Fear Expressed That He
Will Veto Huge Relief
Bill Upon Receipt

MAY GO OVER VETO

House Leaders Predict
Action on Some Sort of
Relief Measure

WASHINGTON, July 5. (AP) Carrying a ten million dollar additional appropriation for the Boulder canyon project, the \$2,100,000 unemployment relief bill was finally approved by the house and senate conferees today, and was expected to be passed on to President Hoover for his consideration either late this afternoon or tomorrow.

Approval of both houses of the measure as finally agreed upon, was expected to result without argument, but the atmosphere was slightly beclouded with the statement by Senator Watson, republican leader, that President Hoover would undoubtedly veto it and insist that congress stay in session until a new measure is passed.

THE BOULDER DAM fund is not in argument, and the president is stated to favor this particular portion of the bill, but he objects to the \$300,000,000 public works provision agreed upon by the conferees. In an attempt to meet this objection the conferees withdrew the bond issue feature and left it up to the treasury department to finance it as desired. This still does not meet with the president's approval, Senator Watson declared.

In addition to the public works, the final draft of the measure provides \$200,000,000 for relief loans to states on a population basis, \$100,000,000 to be distributed on the basis of need.

SENATOR WATSON declared it was President Hoover's proposal to veto the bill and insist that congress stay in session until a new measure is passed, which would prevent adjournment this week.
