

CONGRESS FOR POWER SET-UP

Boulder Dam Has Set Precedent, Senator Dill Explains Here

"With Boulder dam as a precedent, it will not be hard to get congress to adopt similar irrigation project developments," Senator C. C. Dill said this morning while in Wenatchee.

With power paying part of the cost, senators and representatives can see their way clear to vote federal funds for reclamation of lands, he said.

Senator Dill was discussing Franklin D. Roosevelt as a candidate for governor in 1932, Muscle Shoals and the Columbia Basin. Dill describes Roosevelt as a quick thinker and a man with a keen intellect. Though almost an invalid for years, he now appears to have an abundance of vigor, Dill said. "I never worry," Roosevelt told Dill.

The New York governor is the most powerful political figure on the nation's horizon today, in Dill's opinion. His stand on power, his knowledge of the problems and troubles of the working class and his keen insight into world politics fit him well for the president's chair, the senator believes:

"Those who meet him for the first time marvel at his understanding," said Dill. "He has thought clear around all important subjects."

Roosevelt will be democratic nominee for president in 1932 and will be elected, Dill says.

Accompanied by P. D. Donaldson, Senator Dill left Wenatchee this morning for Ephrata and Spokane. He plans to cover the entire state this summer.

"I am glad to be home, glad to be back in the state of Washington, and glad I can go from place to place and meet people without any thought of a political campaign," he says.
