

# Vegas Again Feels Lash of Old Jack Frost

Frozen water pipes greeted Las Vegas residents again this morning when, after a day's respite, the cold wave settled on the community again, sending the mercury down to slightly above 10 degrees above zero for the second time within three days.

The cold weather was said to be responsible for the blast at the E. A. Clark home early this morning, freezing the water jacket in the kitchen stove, which exploded when the sudden heat reached it.

Auto radiators were badly frozen thruout the city and despite precautions of many motorists, some radiators were frozen so badly they burst.

The mercury hovered below the freezing point most of the morning and only a clear sky and a warming sun saved the community from its first full day of below freezing temperatures.

The forecast for tonight was clear and cold, dispatches from southern California revealed.

The zero wave began to relax its hold upon the United States today, leaving the toll of known dead at 65, but the fate of ten men and a woman missing on the schooner Saugatuck off Connecticut remained in doubt, and 700 inhabitants of a fishing community at Sandy Point, Newfoundland, were marooned on their low sand spit with angry surf flooding their homes and endangering their lives.

The Saugatuck, bent on the mission of rescuing a boy who, unknown to its passengers and crew, had been returned home safely, had not been heard from for more than 24 hours today, and grave fears were felt for the thirty-foot auxiliary schooner.

In the United States, temperatures along the Atlantic seaboard were almost as low last night as the night before, and in some cases slightly lower, but in the hard-hit middlewest and in the Rocky Mountain states the mercury was climbing. Below zero temperatures still ruled in many sections, however.

The prospect of higher temperatures brought also, in the Ohio valley, the east and parts of the south, forecasts of snow.
