SCCAO staff work directly with Casitas Municipal Water District to monitor and evaluate under NEPA and ESA effects of operations on public trust resources. Reclamation is currently implementing a Biological Opinion for the operation and maintenance of the Robles Diversion and Fish Ladder. SCCAO staff administer the NEPA process and implements mitigation. During FY 2008, staff will administer terms and conditions of the Biological Opinion and provide professional assistance in agriculture, biology, chemistry, geology, hydrology, fishery management and other natural science to facilitate CMWP activities.

Explanation Change from PFY:

Reclamation currently holds title to the Ventura River Project including Robles Diversion Dam on the Ventura River. The dam is a component of the Ventura River Project. Reclamation concluded consultation with the National Marine Fisheries Service under Section 7 of the Endangered Species Act for the modification of Robles Dam and change of diversion operations to allow passage of adult and young Southern California steelhead trout, an endangered species. It is anticipated that there will be a need to prepare a NEPA analysis and monitoring the effects of modification and operations.

Impact(s) if Unfunded:

Without the proposed funding, activities by Reclamation will not be in compliance with environmental policy and law, thus compromising public safety, potentially harming or taking of listed species and habitat, and improperly managing water and related resources in the public interest. Thus, if unfunded Reclamation may need to reinitiate consultation with the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service. Reclamation continues to strive in assuring that its contractors are using Project water correctly.

In 1973 Congress passed the Reclamation Development Act which added Casitas Open Space Lands to the Ventura Project. As part of the authority for the project, Congress authorized those living in the area to enter into long term use and occupancy leases of 25 years or life estates. These leases are expiring. As the occupants vacate the property, Reclamation is required to demolish the structures and remove hazardous and other refuse to comply with Title IV of the Act. Once these buildings are removed, there will be an on-going resource management effort to maintain the quality of the watershed through vegetation management. In addition, the Casitas Reservoir provides a significant recreational resource for this rapidly urbanizing part of Ventura County and the South Coast. A Resource Management Plan is being prepared to guide the conflicting public goals of recreation and water quality. Implementation of this plan will require coordination with Ventura County, US Forest Service (61,000 acres of withdrawn land for watershed protection are within Los Padres National Forest), Casitas Municipal Water District, and other local agencies.

Explanation Change from PFY:

The first phase of the final home removals has uncovered greater amounts of hazardous materials such as asbestos and lead based paint, than expected in the buildings being demolished and removed. Increased quantities of materials and more stringent disposal requirements have resulted in greater than anticipated costs for these removals.

Under funding of the removal project is causing significant law enforcement problems in the area. Abandoned housing has served as a basis for several unauthorized activities related to clandestine drug activities (being investigated by USFS), skateboarding in abandoned swimming pools, and a rash of arson fires in surrounding fields. These activities are endangering public health and safety.

Impact(s) if Unfunded:

The secluded nature of the properties in the Open Space Lands and failure to demolish previously abandoned structures has led to serious hazardous materials dumping, drug manufacturing activities, unauthorized occupation of vacant buildings, and other unauthorized activities which have resulted in brush fires and the need for response by the County Sheriff. The cost of dealing with the results of unauthorized uses of vacated properties at this location has cost Reclamation more than the demolition of the buildings. Demolition of the buildings has been the only effective way to eliminate unauthorized use and its threat to water quality, Los Padres National Forest, and public safety.

SCCAO will as a continuing activity develop and implement resource protection plans for (1) fire suppression, (2) non-operational waste and hazardous materials management, and (3) soil and moisture conservation. Fire suppression will involve efforts to place first-responder fire protection facilities and equipment at appropriate locations to provide for public safety, and to protect Reclamations land resources from wildfires. Vegetation management programs and prescribed burns will be implemented to manage fuel loads to enhance wildlife habitat, improve recreational opportunities, and to reduce the risk of wildfire. Activities will also include evaluation and disposal of non-operational waste and hazardous materials on Reclamation lands managed for non-operational uses. Programs to manage and discourage waste and hazardous material dumping on Federal property. Soil and moisture conservation programs will address issues related to water quality and soil erosion. The activities will include identification and correction of soil erosion and water quality problems associated with Reclamation lands managed for non-operational uses. Soil and moisture conservation will be furthered through development and implementation of watershed management strategies. The primary goal of this activity is to protect Public Health and Safety through reduction of wildfire risk, management of wastes and hazardous materials, improved water quality, and reduced soil erosion.

Explanation Change from PFY:

Impact(s) if Unfunded:

Public Health and Safety will be jeopardized. Reclamation will not be able to provide low cost fire protection, and manage erosion and water quality to meet NPDES requirements.

Reclamation has a responsibility to conduct reviews and evaluations of its facilities and programs of its managing partners, concessionaires, and others that receive government benefits to ensure that said facilities and programs meet certain accessibility standards through training, upgrading of facilities, and implementation of new design standards. Staff in the SCCAO will serve as the lead in implementing this program. After the first year start-up, annual expenses will increase through 2011 and plateau before declining to accommodate installation of required facilities.

Satisfying the Commissioner's goal of making reservoirs compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) requires ADA compliant equipment, i.e. picnic tables, restrooms, fire pits, showers, telephones. Pathways need grading and paving to reduce slopes to 2% or less. ADA compliant benches, picnic tables, drinking fountains and vending machines are needed, as well as updating or adding the appropriate signage to indicate handicap facilities. Doors and hallways of the buildings need to be expanded to accommodate wheelchairs.

Total cost of \$15 million is required to resolve ADA deficiencies based on a survey performed by technological services in Denver, CO.

Explanation Change from PFY:

This new program is required to meet the Commissioner's goal of ADA compliance. Funds requested assume 50/50 match by managing partners and completion in 2020.

Impact(s) if Unfunded:

Reclamation would be subject to major lawsuits such as those lost by the state of California, which have lead to a cost of several hundreds of millions of dollars.
