History of The American River

Native Americans have lived around the rivers of California for over 12,000 years. The rich natural resources have provided abundant areas to hunt, fish and gather plants.

The discovery of gold at a site along the South Fork of the American River in the Sierra Nevada Mountains in 1848 brought people from around the world and they converged on the American River. The rapid population growth resulted in profound changes in California. The American River and surrounding area became the focus of the world; getting rich quick was the goal. The American River was changed forever.

Managing water has become critical because of the huge population growth and the unpredictable water flows. Currently, Folsom Lake provides flood control, hydroelectricity, recreation, water supply distribution, regulated water for fisheries, environment, delta water quality, and agricultural purposes.


Purpose of the ARWEC


