Proposed Action

The Bella Vista Water District is requesting permission to relocate approximately 719 lineal feet of lateral 2.9S-1.7S and install pavement over portions of Laterals 2.9N, 2.9S, 2.9S-1.7S, and 2.9S-1.7S-0.1W for the Shasta County Department of Public Works East Redding Bike Lane Project. This project is located in Sections 3 and 10, Township 31 North, Range 4 West and Sections 21, 22, 27, and 32-34 in Township 32N, Range 4W, M.D.B.&M, Shasta County.

Environmental commitments, explanations, and/or remarks:

The Bella Vista Water District (District) is requesting permission to relocate a portion of Reclamation's 12-inch water main which is located within Reclamation's 40' wide easement to accommodate the Shasta County Department of Public Works (County) road widening for the East Redding Bike Lanes Project (Project) (Figure 1). In doing so, 719 lineal feet of a new 12-inch C900 PVC pipe would be installed under the edge of the county's roadway where it would have improved protection over its current location. The old portion of pipe will be abandoned in place. There is also a concrete structure that will need to be lowered in grade to accommodate the widening of the County road. The installation of pavement for the bike lanes along Old Oregon Trail and Old Alturas Roads will cross over portions of Lateral 2.9N, 2.9S, 2.9S-1.7S, and 2.9S-1.7S-0.1W. The locations vary in size and are located within the common areas of the Shasta County right-of-way and granted in the U.S. Contract No. 14-06-200-744A dated January 27, 1964 between County of Shasta and the United States titled "Crossing of and interference with Shasta County Highways and Highway Rights-of-Way by Features of the Bella Vista Water District.

The County has submitted the Natural Environment Study (NES) for the East Redding Bike Lanes Project dated September 2005 and Delineation of Waters of the U.S., Including Wetlands dated August 12, 2005. The NES study identifies avoidance and minimization measures, in addition to mitigation measures, that would be implemented to minimize the environment effects of the action. This document also incorporates study findings of the *Delineation of Waters of the U.S., Including Wetlands*, study. These documents are large and are therefore not attached to this CEC; however, they are available upon request.

The District has submitted Form MP-620, Permit for Additions or Alterations to Conveyance Distribution Facilities with plans and specifications. The MP-620 has been approved by Reclamation's Engineer.

Figure 1. Approximate location (highlighted in yellow) where the 12" water main pipeline will be replaced.




Figure 2. Project area details. Area of potential effect for the pipeline placement (shown in yellow).

We reviewed the proposed action by the Bella Vista Water District to relocate approximately 719 lineal feet of lateral 2.9S-1.7S and install pavement over portions of Laterals 2.9N, 2.9S, 2.9S-1.7S, and 2.9S-1.7S-0.1W for the Shasta County Department of Public Works East Redding Bike Lane Project, as described in NCAO-CEC-12-18. Granting permission to relocate a lateral is an undertaking under Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA). As this type of undertaking has the potential to effect historic properties, Reclamation is required to comply with NHPA Section 106, as the process is outlined in 36 CFR Part 800.

We defined the area of potential effects (APE) as including approximately 1 acre for installing the new pipeline segment plus 8 crossings with work areas of approximately 500 square feet each. Efforts to identify historic properties included a record search with the California Historical Resources Information Center, Chico, and a review of a Historic Property Survey Report by California Department of Transportation (CalTrans), dated January 3, 2006. The CalTrans report was for the proposed East Redding Bike Lane Project and CalTrans consulted with the California State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO) regarding an eligibility determination of not eligible for the segment of road associated with the Old Oregon Trail that is within the APE. Concurrence with the not eligible determination was received on March 2, 2006. The CalTrans' NHPA Section 106 consultation process was conducted on a CalTrans' undertaking and did not include Reclamation's undertaking. On January 31, 2013, Reclamation sent letters to the Pit River Tribe of California, the Redding Rancheria, the Wintu Tribe of Northern California, the Shasta Nation, and the Winnemem Wintu Tribe requesting information on historic properties in or near the APE. To date, no responses from the tribes or interested parties have been received.

Reclamation finds no historic properties affected for this undertaking and is consulting with the SHPO pursuant to 36 CFR Part 800. As no historic properties are present, we concur that there will be no significant impacts on historic properties (line 8) on NCAO-CEC-12-18. Please retain a copy of this email for the administrative record for this proposed action. Additional documentation under NHPA Section 106 will be provided as it is completed.
