Background

Lake Woollomes (Lake) is an equalizing reservoir for the Friant-Kern Canal, and is owned by the Bureau of Reclamation (Reclamation). The Lake is located approximately four miles southeast of the town of Delano, in Kern County, California (Figure 1). In addition to its primary purpose, the Lake and surrounding grounds are also used for recreation, which is managed by the Kern County Parks Department according to a 1973 agreement with Reclamation.

In order to enhance recreational opportunities, Kern County has requested a change in the agreement to allow limited power boating on the Lake.

Need for the Proposed Action

Kern County has a need to expand the outdoor recreational experience for the visiting public at the Lake by allowing for limited power boating.

Proposed Action

Reclamation would amend the "Management Agreement Between the United States of America and Kern County for the Development, Administration, Operation, and Maintenance of Recreation and Other Purposes at Lake Woollomes" (U.S. Contract No. 14-06-200-7183A) to allow for limited power boating. Specifically, power boats with electric engines with a maximum of 3 horsepower would be allowed to operate under a speed limit of 3 miles per hour on the Lake.


Environmental Commitments

In order to avoid any potential impacts, Kern County and Reclamation have agreed to implement the following environmental protection measures. Environmental consequences for resource areas assume the measures specified would be fully implemented.

Resource	Protection Measure
Air / Water / Biological / Safety	Motors would be restricted to electric engines with a maximum of 3 horsepower.
Air / Water / Biological / Safety	The maximum speed limit on the Lake would be 3 mph.

Exclusion Category

516 DM 14.5 paragraph D (2): Transfer of the operation and maintenance of Federal facilities to water districts, recreation agencies, fish and wildlife agencies, or other entities where the anticipated operation and maintenance activities are agreed to in a contract or a memorandum of agreement, follow approved Reclamation policy, and no major change in operation and maintenance is anticipated.

The proposed undertaking for the Lake Woollomes Boating Amendment has no potential to cause effects to historic properties pursuant to the Section 106 implementing regulations at 36 CFR Part 800.3(a)(1). Lake Woollomes (Lake) is an equalizing reservoir for the Friant-Kern Canal, and is owned by the Bureau of Reclamation (Reclamation). The Lake is located approximately four miles southeast of the town of Delano, in Kern County, California
