Proposed Action

The State of California, Department of General Services (State) is requesting permission to trench (also referred to as test pits) to gather data regarding the subsurface soil characteristics for the Hoadley Peak Repeater Site Rehabilitation Project (Project). The Project consists of the State constructing a new communication vault and tower at Hoadley Peak to comply with the Department of Interior's rules and regulations. The testing will be located on Reclamation owned land within the fenced area and take place prior to the winter season.

The soil trenching will consist of 5-6 tests pits approximately 2 feet wide by 8 feet long with a depth to refusal on rock, typically 1 to 10 feet deep utilizing a rubber-tire backhoe. A drawing showing the proposed location of the test pits is provided in Figure 1.

The work will be performed by the State's contractor, Stantec Consulting Services, Inc. who previously performed the site survey work.

The Repeater Site is located in Section 27, Township 3 North, Range 8 West, Mount Diable Base and Meridian, Trinity and Shasta Counties.

Exclusion Categories

Bureau of Reclamation Categorical Exclusion – B(3): Planning Activities. Data collection studies that involve test excavations for cultural resources investigations or test pitting, or seismic investigations for geologic exploration purposes where the impacts will be located. 
