







Proposed Action





Figure 2. Site layout for the power line crossing of the South Canal.

PG&E is requesting permission to install, operate, and maintain an overhead electric service line across Reclamation's right-of-way to serve the adjacent landowner, Mr. Brien Hamilton's agricultural pump which will conduct 3-phase 277/480v service. The proposed project is located in Sections 15 and 22, Township 22 North, Range 3 West, MDM in Glenn County (Figure 1). The South Canal at this location is situated on a 60-foot wide United States right of way. The proposed electric service line will extend from an existing pole on the south side of the South Canal, 55-feet to a customer owned meter pole on the north side of the South Canal on Mr. Hamilton's property (Figure 2). A 25-foot minimum clearance over United States right-of-way shall be maintained at all times.

A site visit was conducted on October 30, 2014, and there is no known threatened or endangered species, plant or animal that will be affected and there will be no ground disturbance to the right-of-way.

Exclusion Categories

Bureau of Reclamation Categorical Exclusion - D(10): Issuance of permits, licenses, easements and crossing agreements which provide right-of-way over Bureau of Reclamation lands where the action does not allow or lead to larger public or private action.

Figure 1. Vicinity Map.

This proposed undertaking by Reclamation to authorize PG&E to install, operate, and maintain an overhead electric service line across Reclamation right-of-way. This is the type of undertaking that does not have the potential to cause effects to historic properties, should such properties be present, pursuant to the NHPA Section 106 regulations codified at 36 CFR § 800.3(a)(1). Reclamation has no further obligations under NHPA Section 106, pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.3(a)(1).

The project will involve running a line from an existing PG&E pole from the south of the south Canal to an existing a customer-owned pole on the north side of the canal. The distance between poles is 55-feet. As the poles are already in existence, the undertaking will involve only the stringing of line and there will, therefore, be no associated construction of ground disturbance.

After reviewing NCAO-CEC-14-19, dated December 2014, I am able to concur with line #8 stating, "This action would have no significant impacts on properties listed, or eligible for listing, on the National Register of Historic Places."

This memorandum is intended to convey the completion of the NHPA Section 106 process for this undertaking. Please retain a copy in the administrative record for this action. Should changes be made to this project, additional NHPA Section 106 review, possibly including consultation with the State Historic Preservation Officer, may be necessary.
