Need for the Proposal

The California Department of Fish and Wildlife has requested permission to access Bureau of Reclamation (Reclamation) right-of-way in order to re-sample California tiger salamander (*Ambystoma californiense*) breeding pools along the Friant-Kern and Madera Canals.

Access is needed in order to re-sample breeding pools for federally funded molecular research of California tiger salamanders.

Proposed Action

Reclamation proposes to issue a temporary land use authorization to the California Department of Fish and Wildlife to conduct California tiger salamander surveys along the Friant-Kern and Madera Canals in 2015. Potential site locations are included in Figure 1.



Figure 1 Potential Site Locations for California Tiger Salamander Sampling

Site access would be with one or two passenger vehicles on existing operations and maintenance roads. Dip and seine nets would be used to capture salamanders. A small amount of tissue would be snipped from the animals' tails and then they would be returned to the pools to complete their life cycle.

The project would involve intentional take of California tiger salamanders, and possibly other vernal pool-associated species, such as the vernal pool fairy shrimp (*Branchinecta lynchi*). However, the work would be conducted under a 10(a)(1)(A) "recovery permit" issued by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Exclusion Category

Reclamation proposes to issue a temporary land use authorization to the California Department of Fish and Wildlife to conduct re-sampling surveys of California tiger salamander breeding pools along the Friant-Kern and Madera Canals. Access to proposed survey locations would be via one or two passenger vehicles using existing operations and maintenance roads. Dip and seine nets would be used to capture salamanders for sampling.

The proposed action is the type of undertaking that does not have the potential to cause effects on historic properties, should such properties be present, as outlined in the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) Section 106 implementing regulations at 36 CFR § 800.3(a)(1). As such, Reclamation has no further NHPA Section 106 compliance obligations.
