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Proposed Action




Figure 1. Powerline schematic




Figure 2. Assessor's parcel number map showing the Proposed TCC Crossing location (in red).

PG&E is requesting permission to install a 12kV overhead power line across the Tehama-Colusa Canal right of way at Milepost 102.874 along Marine Avenue, in Arbuckle (Figure 1). The right of way in this area is 190-feet across and PG&E's span is approximately 350'. There will be no ground disturbance or poles within Reclamation's right of way. The power line crossing will service land owned by Ray Charter, Assessor's Parcel No. 021-270-045 and 046 to extend service to an electric irrigation pump located on Charter's property (See Figure 2).

PG&E's work shall take approximately one day to complete and will begin 6 to 8 weeks after the approval from Reclamation.

The location of project is in Section 24, Township 13 North, Range 2 West, Colusa County.

Exclusion Categories

Reclamation proposes to approve/permit the installation of a 12kV overhead power line across the Tehama-Colusa Canal right of way at Milepost 102.874 along Marine Avenue, in Arbuckle. This is the type of undertaking that does not have the potential to cause effects to historic properties, should such properties be present, pursuant to the NHPA Section 106 regulations codified at 36 CFR § 800.3(a)(1). Reclamation has no further obligations under NHPA Section 106, pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.3(a)(1).

The right of way in this area is 190-feet across and PG&E's span is approximately 350'. There will be no ground disturbance or poles within Reclamation's right of way. Reclamation proposes to permit the event through the issuance of a Land Use Authorization. After reviewing documentation provided within CEC-15-08, Reclamation has concluded this action would not have significant impacts on properties listed, or eligible for listing, on the National Register of Historic Places. This document serves as notification that Section 106 compliance has been completed for this undertaking. Please note that if project activities subsequently change, additional NHPA Section 106 review, including further consultation with the SHPO, may be required.
