Proposed Action




Figure 1. Project location map

Pacific Gas and Electric (PG&E) is requesting Bureau of Reclamation (Reclamation) permission to replace a single electric distribution pole on their Keswick 1101 distribution line, located on Reclamation withdrawn land, approximately 2.7 miles north of Keswick in Shasta County, California (Figure 1). The work will be conducted in undeveloped foothill woodland of pine and manzanita, approximately 1,000 feet west of Iron Mountain Road, to be accessed on foot and by air, due to its inaccessibility to a standard line truck or other motorized vehicle. No vegetation removal/pruning is reported as necessary for site access, although six (6) square feet of herbaceous vegetation will be crushed or removed during soil excavation and temporary stockpiling activities.

A crew of the (3) to four (4) workers will carry their equipment on foot approximately 440 feet west of a residential complex, crossing Flat Creek, to the project location. The work crew will dig a new hole approximately one (1) foot east of the existing pole for the replacement pole, disturbing an area of approximately four (4) square feet and excavating approximately six (6) cubic feet of soil, using hand tools. The new pole will be trucked to, and staged at, a cleared location (yet to be determined) with road access, then transported to the site by helicopter where it will be lowered to the hole from above. The work crew will transfer the lines from the old pole to the replacement pole by climbing the poles.

Following installation of the replacement pole, the old pole will be removed and transported to the staging site by the helicopter for off-site disposal. The hole will be backfilled with the generated spoils and disturbed areas of the site returned to their previous contours

The location of project is in Section 6, Township 32 North, Range 5 West, Shasta County, CA.

Environmental commitments, explanations, and/or remarks:

PG&E's consultant, Transcon Environmental Inc. (Transcon) of Berkeley, CA conducted an archaeological survey for the project following Reclamation's Field Authorization procedures. The survey was conducted to verify the lack of cultural resources with the Area of Potential Effect (APE): a 100 foot radius around the distribution pole, as well as a 10-foot wide corridor, 440 feet long, leading from the residential complex to the project location. The survey resulting in a finding of "no historic properties affected", with which the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) concurred.

Transcon also completed a Biological Constraints Review for the project. The report indicated that nesting birds may be present in the project area. Avoidance and minimization procedures to be in place, including PG&E's Avian Protection Plan, require PG&E to cease work and contact a biologist for instruction in the event of encounter with a nesting bird or other sensitive species. However, the temporary, low-intensity nature of the project dictates that project activities are not likely to disturb any sensitive species that might be encountered.

This proposed undertaking by a PG&E is a pole replacement project in Shasta County, California, near the community of Keswick. Reclamation owns the property on which the pole replacement is proposed. Reclamation determined that approval of the proposed project conducted on Federal lands is an undertaking as defined in 36 CFR § 800.16(y) and a type of activity that has the potential to cause effects on historic properties under 36 CFR § 800.3(a).

The proposed project includes removal of vegetation by hand within a 5-foot radius of the proposed new pole location and the excavation of a hole for the placement of the pole. All work for the proposed project will be conducted by hand. The construction crew will walk into the project area from a nearby (440 feet away) residential complex. The new pole will be delivered by helicopter so there will be no off-road vehicle traffic. The lines from the existing pole (1-foot away) will be transferred to the new pole, and the existing pole will be hauled away by helicopter.

In an effort to identify historic properties, PG&E contractor, Transcon Environmental Inc., conducted a records search through the Northeast Information Center, an archival search, and an intensive pedestrian survey of the APE. These efforts identified no historic properties within the APE.

Reclamation sent a letter to the Redding Rancheria on April 14, 2015, (enclosed) to invite their participation in the Section 106 process and request their assistance in the identification of sites of religious and cultural significance or historic properties that may

be affected by the proposed undertaking pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.4(a)(4). Reclamation also sent a letter to the Winnemem Wintu, identified as a Native American organization likely to have knowledge or concerns with historic properties in the area, requesting their assistance in identifying historic properties which may be affected by the proposed undertaking pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.4(a)(3). Reclamation received no responses from the notified tribes.

No historic properties were identified in the APE and, pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.4(d), Reclamation found no historic properties affected for the undertaking.

Reclamation initiated consultation with California the State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO) on May, 27, 2015 with a determination of No Historic Properties Affected for the proposed project. SHPO concurred with the determination in a letter dated July 2, 2015.

This memorandum is intended to convey the completion of the NHPA Section 106 process for this undertaking. Please retain a copy in the administrative record for this action. Should changes be made to this project, additional NHPA Section 106 review, possibly including consultation with the State Historic Preservation Officer, may be necessary.
