Proposed Action

This City of Orland (City) is requesting a construction permit to redirect a segment of an open, active, concrete-lined irrigation ditch in Lateral 8-2 underground, to accommodate the widening of County Road 13 in Orland, CA (Figure 1). The road widening work is necessitated by the construction of the Pilot Flying J Travel Center (Travel Center).





Figure 2. Site Map DOSTRINGS OF FROM REPORALIZED WITHOUT SECURITIONS SHAPERAR DUNIALP SAWRERS BUCK ADDE LABELITY FOR THE DESTRINGS OF MON-COSTRICE LIMIS. CONTRINCTORS AND OTHERS USING THESE OF COMPRISE THROUT OF SECURITION OF UNRECORDING LIMIS OF STRUCTURES PROOF TO SECONSHIP DAYS IN ADVISIONAL DAYS DECEMBER OF THE SECONSHIP DAYS IN ADVISIONAL DECEMBER OF THE SECONSHIP DAYS IN ADVISIONAL DECEMBER OF THE SECONSHIP DAYS DECEMBER OF THE SECONSHIP DECEMBER OF THE SECONSHIP DAYS DECEMBER DAYS DECEMBE RIGHTS OF USBR. AND O.U.W.U.A. COUNTY ROAD 18

Lateral 8-2 is located in a 30-foot wide easement owned by the United States within the City's right-of-way along the south side of County Road 13 (Figure 2). The City proposes to re-route approximately 550 feet of the open ditch underground through high-density polyethylene pipe. Valves will be installed in place of open-ditch turnouts to provide irrigation water to the lands to the south (Figure 3). The realignment is necessary to widen County Road 13 and reinforce the road to accommodate vehicle traffic associated with the construction of the proposed Travel Center. The ditch in Lateral 8-2 was dry at the time of reconnaissance.

The proposed Travel Center development is located at the southwest quadrant of Interstate 5 and Newville Road on Glenn County Assessor's Parcel Numbers 045-170-003, -005, 045-140-003, -010, -011, -012, in Section 21 Township 22 and Range 3W, M.D.M., Glenn County, CA. Plans for the City's component of the project are provided in Figure 3.

Exclusion Categories

Environmental commitments, explanations, and/or remarks:

The City's consultant, PMC of Chico, CA, completed a review of biological resources for the Flying J project. PMC's Project Study Area, as defined in Figure 3.2-1 of their Draft Environmental Impact Report, did not include Reclamation's property. Reclamation therefore performed its own online research via the US Fish and Wildlife Service's (USFWS) Information for Planning and Conservation (IPaC) application and the California Fish & Wildlife's (CAFWS) California Natural Diversity Database (CNDDB) Rare Find 5 application and associated Biogeographic Information & Observation System (BIOS) viewer complement. Research on Reclamation's adjacent, more refined, Site produced less, but overlapping, returns in comparison to PMC's. Species Federally listed as Threatened, Endangered or Candidate with the potential to inhabit the Site, according to the IPaC report, were limited to the California Red-legged Frog (Rana draytonii), Conservancy fairy shrimp (Branchinecta conservation), vernal pool fairy shrimp (Branchinecta lynchi), vernal pool tadpole shrimp (Lepidurus packardi), Delta smelt (Hypomesus transpacificus), Central Valley Steelhead (Oncorhynchus mykiss), Valley elderberry longhorn beetle (Desmocerus californicus dimorphus) and the giant garter snake (Thamnophis gigas). Seventeen species protected under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act were also reported. No Critical Habitat was reported in the IPaC report, nor were any sitings of any of the aforementioned species reported in the BIOS output. The ditches are not perennially wet. No natural or artificial borrow holes were observed in the ditches by PCM, nor were any elderberry or other trees or shrubs observed on or adjacent to the Site. The site does not function as a wildlife corridor, based on description and photographs. Reclamation agrees with PCM's determination that the Project will have "no affect" on the California red-legged frog due to its assumed extirpation from the Valley floor and has determined that the Project has "no effect" on the remaining, aforementioned, Federally-listed ESA species reported as having the potential to occur on the Site, due to lack of suitable habitat.

Figure 3. Site Plan







Figure 3, Cont.



Reclamation proposes to authorize the City of Orland to pipe a segment of Lateral 8-2 for widening of County Road HH (Commerce Lane) and County Road 13 (Ide Street) to accommodate vehicle access to the proposed Pilot Flying J Travel Center. This action constitutes an undertaking with the potential to cause effects to historic properties, assuming such properties are present, requiring compliance with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) as amended.

Based on historic properties identification efforts conducted Reclamation, and in-house background research, Reclamation consulted with, and received concurrence from, the State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO) on a finding of no historic properties affected pursuant to 36 CFR §800.4(d)(1). Consultation correspondence between Reclamation and the SHPO has been provided with this cultural resources compliance document for inclusion in the administrative record for this action.

This document serves as notification that Section 106 compliance has been completed for this undertaking. Please note that if project activities subsequently change, additional NHPA Section 106 review, including further consultation with the SHPO, may be required.

On February 22, 2016 the Office of Historic Preservation received your letter requesting to initiate consultation for the above-referenced undertaking. The Bureau of Reclamation (Reclamation) is consulting pursuant to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act and its implementing regulations found at 36 CFR Part 800 (as amended). Along with the consultation letter, the following documents were provided:

- Project Location and Area of Potential Effects (APE) mapping
- Archaeological Resource Survey Report for the Proposed Pilot Flying J Travel Center Project. (Tyler and Ritter 2015).

Reclamation is considering authorizing the City of Orland to pipe a segment of Lateral 8-2 (approximately 3 feet long by 550 feet long) for widening of County Road HH (Commerce Lane) and County Road 13 (Ide Street) to accommodate vehicle access to the proposed Pilot Flying J Travel Center. Reclamation has determined that the area of potential effects (APE) for this undertaking is a corridor comprising 1.11-acres.which includes all project related actions. The vertical APE is a maximum depth of 5 feet below the current surface.

Efforts to identify historic properties that may be affected by the undertaking included a records search, pedestrian survey, and Native American consultation. The records search indicated that the area had not been previously surveyed, and no known properties were in the APE.

Reclamation identified Lateral 8-2 as being within the APE. Lateral 8-2, constructed in 1916 as a component of the Orland Project, is lined with a rough concrete finish. Reclamation has determined that Lateral 8-2 does not meet the National Register criteria, either individually or as a component of the larger Orland Project.

Reclamation is seeking comments on the delineation of the APE, efforts to identify historic properties, and is seeking concurrence with its determination that Lateral 8-2 is not eligible for listing. Reclamation is notifying me of its no historic properties affected finding. Following staff review of the submitted documentation, I have the following comments:

- Pursuant to 36 CFR 800.4(a)(1), I have no objections to the APE as defined.
- Pursuant to 36 CFR 800.4(b), I find that Reclamation has made a reasonable and good faith effort to identify historic properties within the area of potential effects.
- Pursuant to 36 CFR 800.4(c)(2), Reclamation has determined Lateral 8-2 is not individually eligible for the National Register. I concur.
- Pursuant to 36 CFR 800.4(d)(2); it appears that there are no historic properties located within the project area for this undertaking and, therefore, I do not object to a finding of no historic properties affected.

Please be advised that under certain circumstances, such as unanticipated discovery or a change in project description, Reclamation may have additional future responsibilities for this undertaking under 36 CFR Part 800 (as amended).
