Proposed Action

On December 19, 2012, by Gift Deed recorded in the Official Records of Sutter County, California as Document No. 2012-0021329, Burton H. Lauppe and Kathryn L. Lauppe, individually and as Trustees of the Lauppe Family Trust dated September 22, 1997 voluntarily conveyed all interest of the land within the Contractor's Service Area delineated in Exhibit B of Sacramento River Settlement Contract No. 14-06-200-1364Y-R-1 to Alan Lauppe, Joan Johnson, and Warren Lauppe, all as tenants-in-common.

At the request of the new property owners, Reclamation will assign the interests in Sacramento River Settlement Contract No. 14-06-200-1364Y-R-1 from E.L.H. Sutter Properties to Alan Lauppe, Joan Johnson, and Warren Lauppe, all as tenants-in-common, to correspond with the change in property ownership. (Variances between the original and current signatories for the contract are due to family ownership changes due to inheritance.) Reclamation's authority for the action is granted by Article 33 of the Settlement Contract.

The property is located in a portion of Township 11N, Range 3E, Section 36, Mount Diablo Meridian, Sutter County, CA (Attachment 1). The APN is 35-030-017. The latitude/longitude is approximately 121°35'4.12"W, 38°45'6.64"N. The property is in agricultural production and will remain so for the foreseeable future.

Exclusion Categories





A the request of the new property owners, Reclamation proposes to assign the interests in Sacramento River Settlement Contract No. 14-06-200-1364Y-R-1 from E.L.H. Sutter Properties to Alan Lauppe, Joan Johnson, and Warren Lauppe, all as tenants-in-common, to correspond with a change in property ownership.
