Proposed Action

Reclamation will assign a portion of the Central Valley Project water (Project Water) under contract 14-06-200-3376A-LTR1 between Reclamation and Shasta County Water Agency (SCWA) to the City of Shasta Lake (COSL).

In March of 1998 SCWA began providing Project Water to COSL via a subcontract under SCWA's contract with Reclamation. Under the subcontract, SCWA provides up to 50 acre-feet (AF) of Project Water to COSL to meet a portion of COSL's annual water needs. By letter dated March 26, 2013, SCWA requested that Reclamation begin the process of assigning the 50 AF to COSL. Through this partial contract assignment, Reclamation will provide 50 AF of the 1,022 AF SCWA has under contract with Reclamation directly to COS, rather than providing it indirectly to COSL through SCWA's subcontract.





Environmental Commitments, Explanations, and/or Remarks

Presently, both SCWA and COSL have water service contracts with Reclamation. As part of SCWA's contract they have subcontracted with COSL to provide COSL with 50 acre-feet of Project Water per year. COSL desires to have a direct contractual relationship with Reclamation. SCWA has expressed a willingness to make a partial contract assignment of its contract number, 14-06-200-3367A-LTR1, to COSL. This action involves only implementation of administrative and financial changes. Reclamation will provide the water directly to COSL via a partial contract assignment, instead of through a subcontract with SCWA. There will be no change in the place of use, purpose of use, quantity, or point of diversion for the Project Water provided to COSL as a result of this action. No modification to any facilities or construction will result from this action.



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Reclamation proposes to approve a proposal to assign 50 acre-feet of SCWA's remaining 1,022 acre-feet of CVP water to COSL. SCWA previously has provided CVP water to COSL via subcontracts. The currently proposed action would involve Reclamation providing water directly to COSL through a partial assignment contract, rather than through a SCWA subcontract. This action involves only implementation of administrative and financial changes. The proposed action will result in no change in the place of use, purpose of use, quantity, or point of diversion for the CVP water provided to COSL. No modifications to any facility or new construction will result from this action.

The proposed action is a Federal undertaking, as defined at 36 CFR § 800.16(y). Reclamation has determined this undertaking involves the type of activity that has no potential to cause effects on historic properties, assuming such properties are present. Pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.3(a)(1), Reclamation has no further obligations under 54 U.S.C. 306108, commonly known as Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA). Item 8 on Categorical Exclusion Checklist NCAO-CEC-16-09 is supported by this determination.

This document conveys the completion of the NHPA Section 106 process for this undertaking. Please retain a copy in the administrative record for this action. Should changes to the proposed action be made, additional Section 106 review, possibly including consultation with the State Historic Preservation Officer, may be required.
