Nature of the Action

Reclamation will issue a 25-year land-use authorization to PG&E that would allow them to install, operate, and maintain a 172-foot long overhead transmission line overcrossing Lateral 24.2 near and east of the intersection between Avenue 16 and Road 22 in Madera County, California (Figure 1). This transmission line would provide year-round service to one new customer. The line would originate from an existing pole and then be connected onto two new PG&E poles located on either side of Lateral 24.2 in Madera County's Right of Way (ROW). Three aerial aluminum (3-2AR) conductors would extend over Lateral 24.2 requiring a minimum 35 foot clearance over the canal.

Each pole would require a 13 inch diameter hole dug with an auger (7 feet deep). The trenching would be 8 feet x 220 feet, and 31 inches deep. Equipment that will be used to perform the work include 1 Line Truck (Auger), 1 Line Truck (no auger), and 1 Foreman truck. The entire project would take approximately four days to complete and will be installed in line with and connected to PG&E's existing lines, poles, and related appurtenances (see Figure 1).

Project location: SE ¼ SEC 7, T11S, R17E, Mount Diablo Base & Meridian, as depicted on the Mendota 7.5' U.S. Geological Survey quadrangle map.

Environmental Commitments

PG&E shall implement the following environmental protection measures to avoid and/or reduce environmental consequences associated with the Proposed Action (Table 1). Environmental consequences for resource areas assume the measures specified would be fully implemented.

Reclamation proposes to issue a 25-year land-use authorization to PG&E that would allow them to install, operate, and maintain a 172-foot long overhead transmission line overcrossing Lateral 24.2 near and east of the intersection between Avenue 16 and Road 22 in Madera County, California. Reclamation determined that issuance of this authorization constitutes an undertaking subject to review under Title 54 U.S.C. § 306108, commonly known as Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, and its implementing regulations found at 36 CFR Part 800, and involves the type of activity that has the potential to cause effects on historic properties under 36 CFR § 800.3(a).

Efforts to identify historic properties in the area of potential effects (APE) for this undertaking were conducted by Garcia and Associates (GANDA) on behalf of PG&E. A segment of Lateral 24.2 was the only cultural resource identified and recorded by GANDA. Lateral 24.2 is a component of the MID water distribution and delivery system, which delivers water to MID customers from Reclamation's Madera Canal, a component of the Central Valley Project (CVP). For the purposes of the current undertaking only, Reclamation assumed that the entire MID water distribution system, including Lateral 24.2, are eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places under Criterion A, under the themes of water conveyance and the development of agriculture in the San Joaquin Valley. For the current undertaking, Reclamation reached a finding of no adverse effect on historic properties, pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.5(b). Reclamation entered into consultation with the State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO) on this finding of effect and, through correspondence dated August 22, 2016, received SHPO concurrence. With receipt of SHPO concurrence, Reclamation's responsibilities under Section 106 are fulfilled.

This document conveys the completion of the Section 106 process and NEPA review for the undertaking. Item 8 on CEC-15-036 is supported by Reclamation's Section 106 finding: the proposed action will not adversely affect properties listed or eligible for listing in the National Register of Historical Places. Please retain a copy of this document with the administrative record for this action. Should the proposed action change, additional review under Section 106, including further consultation with the SHPO, may be required.

Thank you for your letter received July 13, 2016. Pursuant to 36 CFR Part 800 (as amended 8-05-04) regulations implementing Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, the Bureau of Reclamation (BOR), is initiating formal consultation, seeking my comments on its determination of the Area of Potential Effects (APE) and its determination that no adverse effects to historic properties will occur by implementation of the above referenced undertaking pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.5(b). The BOR is reviewing a proposed project submitted by PG&E to install a power pole and 35 foot high aerial transmission line over Lateral 24.2. The BOR is assuming the entire MID to be eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) under Criterion A and has determined that this undertaking will not cause an adverse effect, only a minimal visual introduction. Tribal consultation, records search review, consideration for the presence of buried resources, and pedestrian survey, identified no additional cultural resources in the APE or concerns over the project. Having reviewed your letter and supporting documentation, I have the following comments:

- 1. I agree that the BLM's delineation of the project's Area of Potential Effects is consistent with 36 CFR 800.16(d).
- 2. I concur pursuant to 36 CFR § 800 (5)(b) that no historic properties will be adversely affected by this undertaking.

Be advised that under certain circumstances, such as unanticipated discovery or a change in project description, the BOR may have additional future responsibilities for this undertaking under 36 CFR Part 800.
