

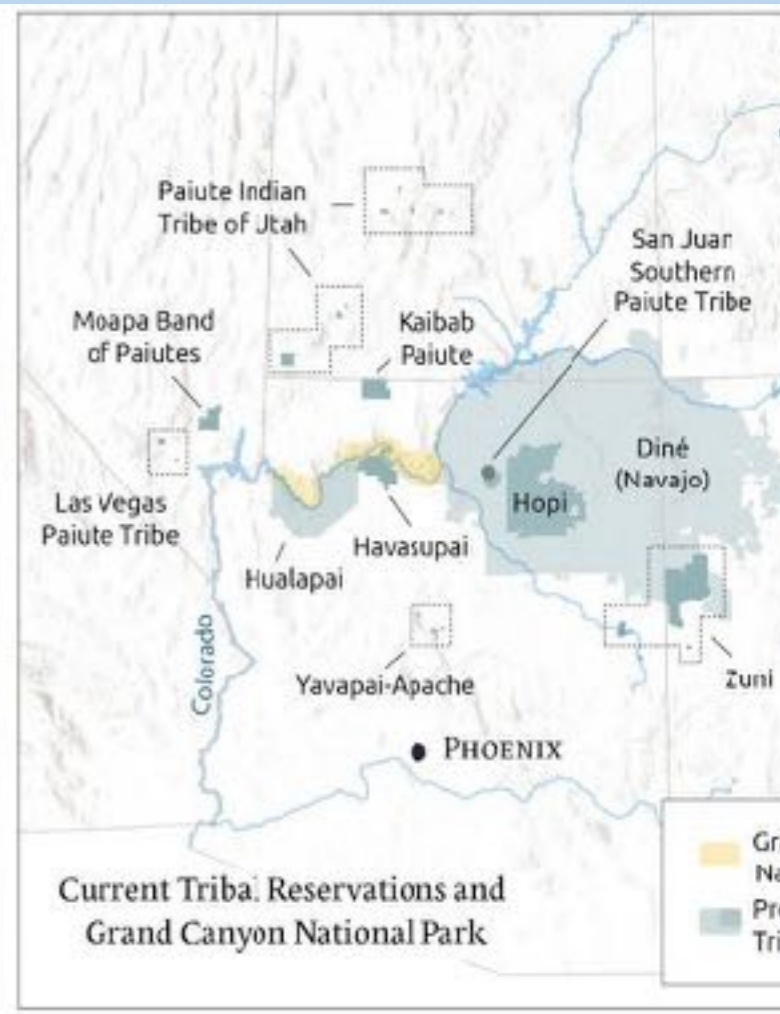
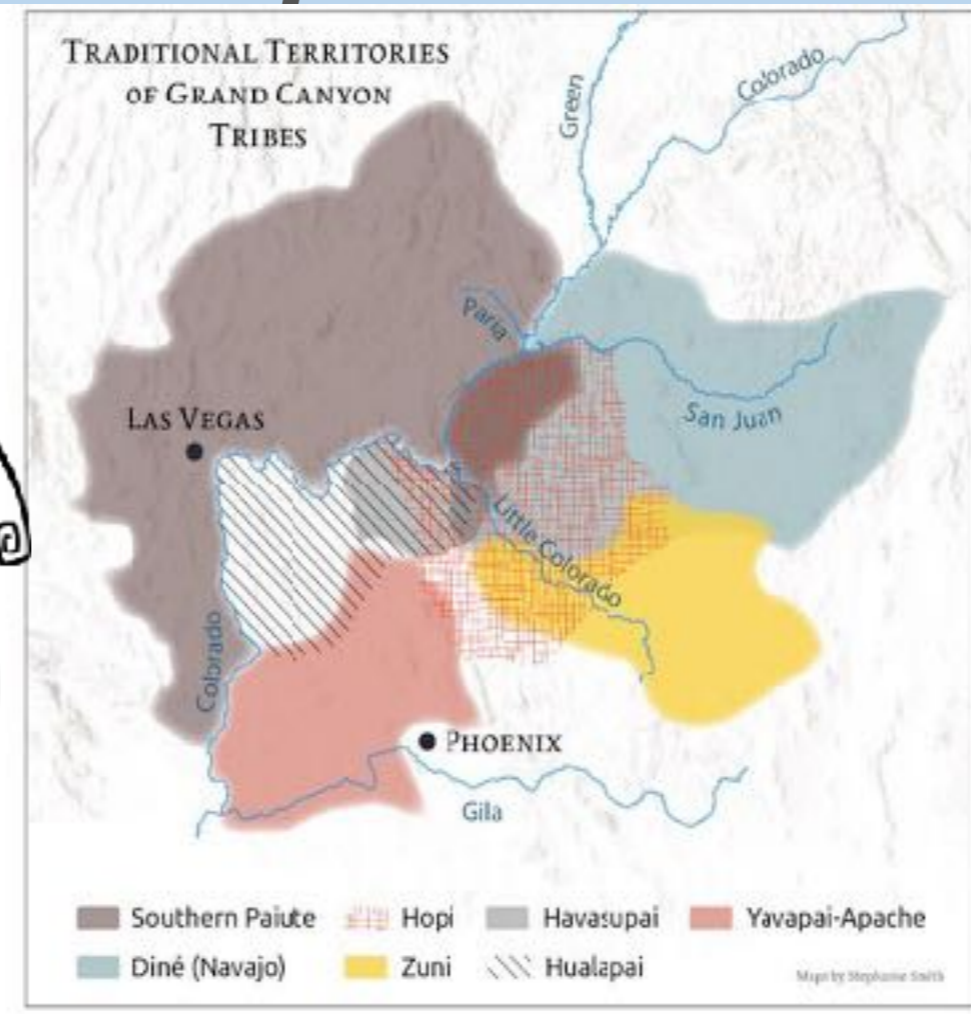
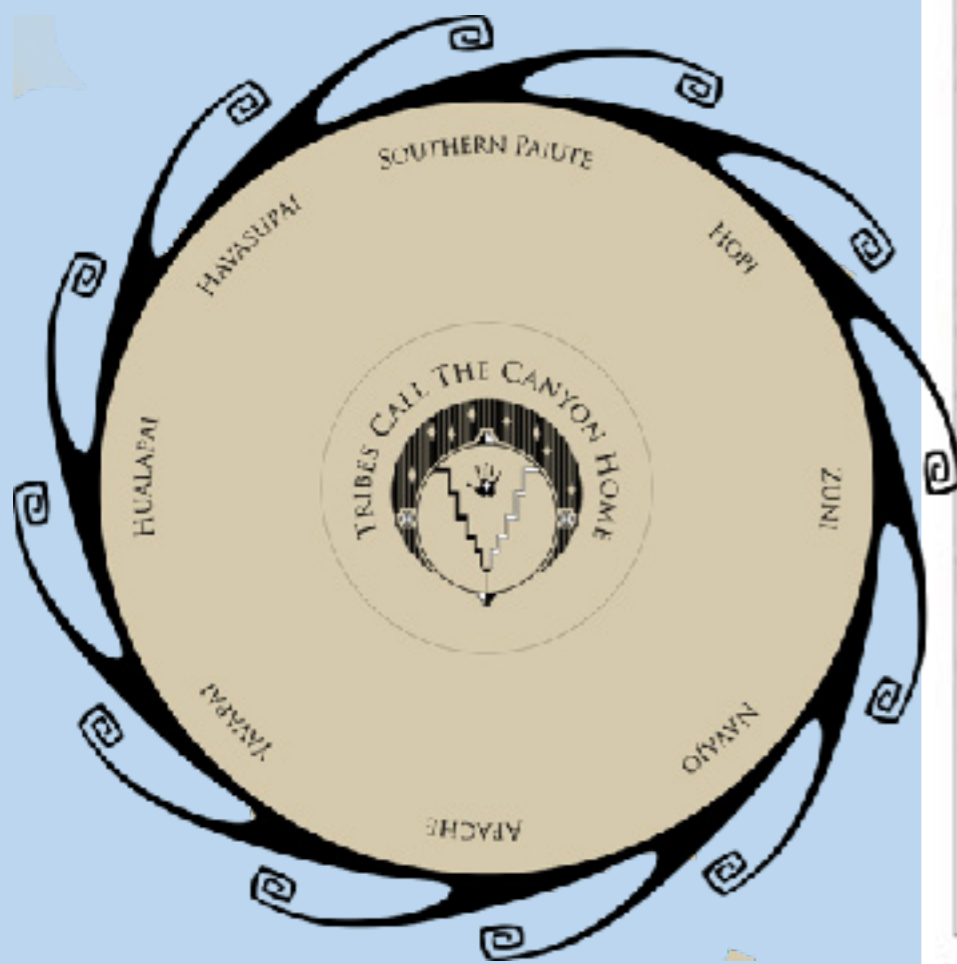
Paria Beach Restoration Project

The project's overall goals are...

- restore the natural shoreline, native riparian ecosystem functions, and natural riverside habitats along the Colorado River below Glen Canyon Dam
- improve recreation experiences, including fishing, wildlife viewing, boating, and beach visitation; sustain the local recreation economy
- engage and empower members of local and regional communities, and specifically Native American youth, in hands-on, place-based learning with riparian restoration projects



Why is Paria Beach important? Cultural values...



The Tribes' traditional territories reflect past archaeological and ethno-historic work. These areas rely on the best data to date but are provisional and have the inherent limitation of imposing lines on a fluid and evolving subject.

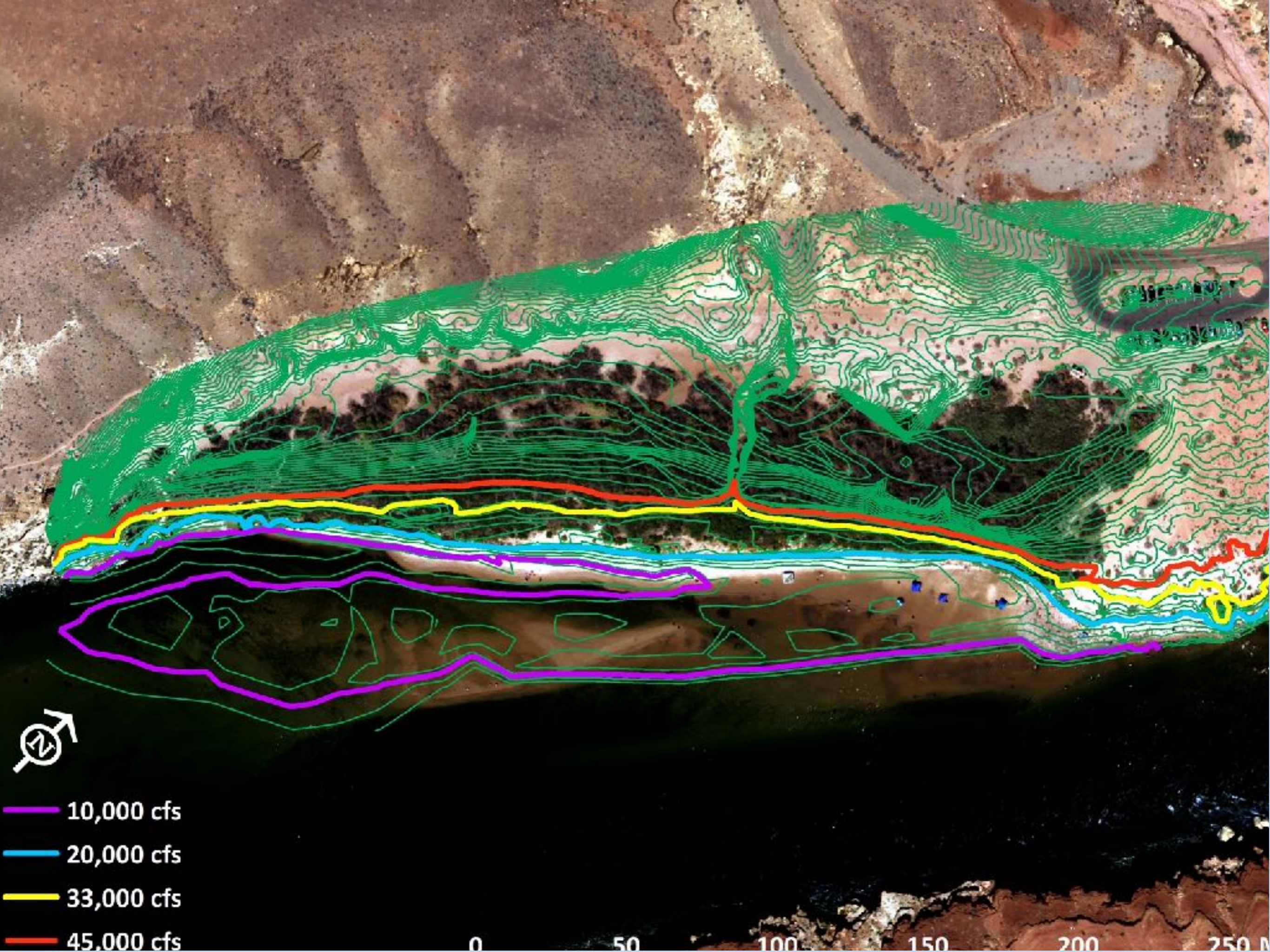
